GET INTERACTIVE

The University has secured a one-year institutional licence for a new voting response system. Ombea enables users to respond to questions using either their own device (mobile phone, tablet, laptop) or a specific handset. Questions can range from multiple choice answers to priority ranking and free text word clouds.

Question slides can be added to PowerPoint presentations (Windows only) so lecturers can insert interactive slides in to their pre-prepared presentations.

Both staff and students gave enthusiastic feedback for Ombea during the system's pilot phase. Student engagement and ease of use were given as the top two benefits.

A panel discussion with students provided an insight in to how students are using our core e-learning technologies at the University of Kent and how these and other technologies are supporting learning.

Additional workshops included tips on how to make resources more accessible to all users and where to find third-party tools for teaching and learning.

LAUNCH OF UOK MOOC

The latest University of Kent MOOC has launched on the online platform, FutureLearn. Understanding Autism runs for a month and requires a weekly three hours of study. It's free, but there are paid for options which provide extended access to resources and certification.

Dr Jill Bradshaw from the Tizard Centre is leading the course which covers topics including what is autism; social communication skills and lived experiences of people on the autism spectrum.

Our Distance Learning Technologist, Dr Mark O'Connor, has helped to produce the course.

MOODLE 2018 LEADS THE WAY ON ACCESSIBILITY

The Blackboard Ally accessibility and usability tool has been integrated in Moodle 2018 during the current academic year. Our Moodle virtual learning environment is one of the first to adopt the tool which provides a traffic light accessibility score on uploaded files for lecturers and gives students the opportunity to download these files in alternative formats such as audio and electronic Braille. Lecturers can easily see how accessible their files are, and also get step-by-step guidance on how to make them even more accessible.
