Developing Sustainability in the curriculum: a hue, a shade different

In this interactive workshop we will explore barriers and opportunities related to Education for Sustainability in the curriculum of universities. Participants will be invited to identify key issues that are relevant to them, make connections between sustainability and their subject areas and share their own experiences. Our approach is well-articulated by our colleague Karen having engaged with our Futures Initiative programme, *“actually there is a duty upon us as educators to not think (sustainability) is an add-on but this is actually intrinsic. (...) In one sense it’s quite nuanced, but in another one it’s quite profound. It’s almost like a hue, almost like a shade different.”*

Practical Sustainability: Using the campus as Living Lab

Set in the ancient Brotherhood Wood, Billhook Nook has been used as a practical outdoor teaching space by Ian for a number of years. Through the University's *Study Plus* programme Ian has been teaching students traditional woodland management skills and crafts including coppicing, fence making, Xmas wreaths, and basket-making. Ian will explain the benefits of using the campus as a Living Lab to enhance students' experiential learning. Participants will be encouraged to discuss the potential for other Living Lab opportunities across campus.
