Scratch tapes

[The] material is often raw and undeveloped and many of these fragments did not appear in the final work. Some of the original tapes were damaged or in some cases like Birdsong completely missing. Where there was many hours of footage we tried to where possible to select material which had a linking thread to the final work. These were some of the factors which influenced the selection of scratch footage to be included in the archive. In some ways it is quite a patchy record of this process but hopefully gives the viewer some insight into the making of the work.
